FRIENDS OF The Milne Public Library

As I reflect on the past 12 months, it feels like a year of great highs and much to celebrate, and yet it closes with great loss. The passing of Ginny Sheldon leaves all of us bereft. Ginny was the heart and soul of this organization, and the ripple effects of her passing are still visible. I believe that we are all determined to carry the torch for her and not let it lose a single iota of its light. And yet, there is an emptiness still, a feeling that we've lost something central and core.

But even as we struggle with this loss, people are stepping up, ready to do more, wanting to help. On a daily basis, our members are pulling together, collaborating, sharing ideas, committed to figuring out the paths forward so that the Friends will remain a strong and vital force on behalf of our library.

Ginny spread lots of seeds, and those seeds are alive and growing, and they include those people volunteering at the Donation Center, the store, and in other community endeavors. She recruited many, if not most of us over her many years working on behalf of the library. She had a talent and a flair for connecting people and drawing them in. That may be one of the geniuses of Ginny – bringing us together. And while I'm sure she expected to be with us much longer, she did make sure that we were here and ready to sprout and grow. That is no small legacy.

The paradox of 2024 is that it was in many ways also the best year ever for the Friends financially, including membership of over 200 households contributing more than \$24,000 in 2024. Our financial picture is solid:

- Total assets: \$551,665 (+\$12,991)
- Gross revenue: \$165,996 (+\$17,243)
- CTB Gross Revenue: \$103,238 (+\$12,527)
- Total contributions (including WordsAreWonderful): \$102,080 (+\$58,007)



None of this would have been possible without the ongoing dedication of our volunteers. We had a wonderful celebratory event in their honor in November. One of the highlights of that event was the comments by our new library director, Angie Zimmermann. The Friends have enjoyed a great partnership with Angie and and many positive things have happened already! In Angie's remarks to the Friends during the Volunteer Appreciation Event, she expressed a heartfelt appreciation of the Friends and the huge impact of our support.

And I want to comment on the marvelous year of 150th Anniversary celebratory events, much to the credit of Judy Ensign and her 150th Celebration Committee. It's clear that this library has played an important role in Williamstown for a century and a half. Our mutual efforts with the library staff, the Trustees, and the town will help insure the next 150 years!

We have a strong board who are enthusiastic and actively engaged. I have come to the end of my 3-year term as president and we welcome Elizabeth Whitney to that role, with Stephen Winkler as our new vice president. Our treasurer Ray Hiley and our secretary Gwen Steege are both continuing. Our board is rounded out by the following members: Pam Art, Jennifer Bayliss, Craig Clemow, Lisa Hiley, Anne Islan, Elizabeth St. Clair, and Michael Sussman.

So now, looking ahead to 2025, I feel very hopeful and positive about our ability to continue to run a beloved bookstore, engage over 70 active volunteers, partner with a gem of a library, and ultimately bring more vitality than ever to our growing library that serves our diverse and wonderful town.





During the early months of 1874, a man by the name of Joseph White was using his considerable influence by urging the town's selectmen to found a free public library. White was an honors graduate of Williams college, a lawyer turned judge, who eventually settled permanently in Williamstown.

During the 1850s, he would have been well aware that New England was leading the country in establishing government-funded free public libraries. While local residents had limited access to subscription libraries, the costs to use these were undoubtedly more than most families could afford.

The minutes left to us from the [March 9, 1874 Williamstown town meeting] established that attendees: "Voted, that the town of Williamstown appoint a board of trustees consisting of five persons, two of whom shall be women, to take charge of the town library, to purchase books, to appoint a librarian, to provide rooms . . . [all of these to] be paid by the treasurer of the town from the dog fund."

The taxpayer-supported library unwrapped for residents a world of new information and ideas when it opened in a corner of Cole's General Store on Water Street, a building that is still in use today.



In 1908, with approximately 1,500 cardholders and a rapidly expanding collection of books, the public library was forced into relocation, this time to larger quarters on the ground floor of the Masonic Building on Main Street, just a block away from Cole's.

The location was sufficient for the next 33 years, but by 1941 more room was needed. Fortunately, the library was able to move right next door into the spacious home that had been donated to the town by E. Herbert Botsford in memory of his daughter. He stipulated the library be housed on the ground level and the second-floor be occupied by the Williamstown House of Local History (now known as the



Williamstown Historical Museum).

During the 1980s the trustees of the library continued to look at ways of expanding the library facilities. Space became more and more cramped as the collection grew and circulation expanded. During the early 1990's a plan was formulated for the library to move to the former Pine Cobble School building as the private school moved to the High Croft School campus on Gale Road. David and Joyce Milne, owners of The High Croft School, gave the town the former Pine Cobble School as a gift in the exchange.

The David and Joyce Milne Public Library building, the former home of Pine Cobble School, was constructed in 1971 to replace the old school building which burned to the ground in January 1970. The structure was designed by Martin



Lowenfisch. The design of the building's large arching front windows reflect the architect's desire to capture the design themes of the First Congregational Church and Thompson Memorial Chapel located on Main Street.

The building required extensive renovation to transform it from a school to a public library. After three years of construction, the new library was dedicated on November 23, 1996. Construction was finally completed in 1999.

For the past 150 years, Williamstown's small library has been a busy and active community of ideas, whose mission reflects the town's interests and values. It offers a safe and inclusive location for concerts and story times, art exhibitions and lectures, a place to read a newspaper or just sit and think. Patrons can meet other book lovers, play chess, put together a jigsaw puzzle, or join a book club. It is a place for education and entertainment, social connections and personal development.

Patrons find this library a place to work or even apply for work; a place for taking classes or undertaking research; a place for reflective thought. Children can hear someone read a story; teenagers can find a place to dream and let their imaginations run wild. The surroundings are always safe, friendly, and inclusive. Best of all, you're never alone with a book. We've got 150 years of stories, read one. They're addictive. –Judy Ensign


